CAMOUFLAGE IN TREE TOPS


PALE-THROATED SLOTH

Sloths are typically arboreal animals which spent most of their days hanging from tree branches. They have strong claws which prevent them from falling down. Once in a time they climb down to the ground, not staying there for long, however, and immediately dart back up. ◀



SMART DISGUISE

If a sloth lives in the wild, its fur is covered with algae which make it turn grey-green. It therefore works like an invisibility cloak in the surrounding mass of green leaves! ▶

Once its paws touch the ground, the sloth becomes incredibly vulnerable. It's because moving on the ground is very hard for sloths - it looks more like they're crawling. This makes them an easy prey for jaguars or harpys. ▶
